Instructions

Requirement Instructions

- 1) Requirement 2 should be completed **prior to the first session of PowWow**. (Prior to PowWow, the Scout should also have completed the readings listed in requirement 4 and be prepared to discuss them on the first Saturday.)
- 2) Requirements 1, 4, and 5 should be passed off during the first Saturday.
- 3) Requirements 3 and 8 must be completed as **homework** during the time between the two sessions of PowWow.
- 4) Requirements 6 and 7 should be passed of during the second Saturday.
